#### S550 CORRADO, O'TOOLE

AN ACT establishing a "Bi-State Commission to Recommend 1 2 Reforms to the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey."

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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- The States of New York and New Jersey find and declare that:
- The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey operates and maintains infrastructure critical to trade, transportation, and the economy in New York and New Jersey and throughout the surrounding region including four bridges, two tunnels, a rail system, three bus terminals, ferry services, marine terminals and ports, five airports, and the World Trade Center;
  - b. Since the Port Authority is a bi-state authority established by compact between the State of New York and the State of New Jersey, reforms to address the internal structure of the Port Authority and to increase its accountability and transparency are required to be included in substantially identical legislation enacted by both states; and
- c. It is in the best interests of the residents of New York and 21 22 New Jersey that an independent bi-state commission study the 23 current structure of the Port Authority and submit to the legislatures 24 of New York and New Jersey recommendations to address problems
  - at the Port Authority and to protect the public's investment in the region's transportation infrastructure.

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There is hereby created a commission to be known as the "Bi-State Commission to Recommend Reforms to the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey."

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- 3. a. The commission shall consist of 12 members, of whom six shall be appointed by the State of New York and six shall be appointed by the State of New Jersey in the manner determined by the legislatures of each state respectively.
- 36 b. The members appointed pursuant to the provisions of 37 (pending before the Legislature as this bill) shall be 38 independent public administration and transportation experts, 39 policymakers, and practitioners, but shall not be current 40 commissioners, officers, directors, or employees of the Port 41 Authority.

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The members shall be appointed within 30 days of the effective date of P.L., c. (pending before the Legislature as this bill). 44

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46 The commission shall organize no later than 30 days after 47 the appointment of the majority of its members, and shall select a chairperson and vice-chairperson from among its members. The 48

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chairperson shall appoint a secretary, who need not be a member of the commission. The commission shall meet at the call of the chairperson and hold hearings at the times and in the places it may deem appropriate and necessary to fill its charge. The members shall serve without compensation.

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5. The commission shall be entitled to call to its assistance and avail itself of the services of the employees of any State department, board, bureau, commission, agency, authority, or other entity, as it may require and as may be available, and to employ stenographic and clerical assistance and incur traveling and other miscellaneous expenses as may be necessary in order to perform its duties, within the limits of funds available to it for its purpose.

- 6. a. The purpose of the commission shall be to study the current structure, management, and oversight of the Port Authority and to recommend legislation in a report to the legislatures of the State of New Jersey and the State of New York to reform the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey.
- b. The report shall include findings, conclusions, recommendations, or legislative proposals supported by a majority of the members of the commission including, but not limited to:
- (1) Policies to address divisions between the Port Authority's New York and New Jersey counterparts and an analysis of whether the Port Authority could be restructured to resolve the two state's divergent goals and objectives;
- (2) Policies to address operational, structural, and management issues at the Port Authority;
- (3) Policies to address terms and method of appointment for Port Authority commissioners and senior leadership;
- (4) Policies establishing a formal and transparent process concerning non-emergency operational changes at the Port Authority, including an advance study of the proposed change, an internal approval process, and local government notification requirements; and
- (5) An analysis of the reforms implemented through New York's Public Authorities Report Act of 2009 and a determination of whether similar reforms should be implemented at the Port Authority.
- c. The report may also include, in a separate section, any finding, conclusion, recommendation, or legislative proposal that receives the support of a minority of commissioners.

7. The commission shall prepare and submit a report containing its findings, conclusions, recommendations, and legislative proposals to the governors and legislatures of New York and New Jersey no later than 12 months after the date of its initial meeting.

8. The New Jersey members of the commission shall be 1 2 appointed as follows: two by the Senate President; two by the 3 Speaker of the General Assembly; one by the Minority Leader of the Senate; and one by the Minority Leader of the General 4 5 Assembly. 6 7 9. Sections 1 through 7 of this act shall take effect upon 8 enactment of substantially similar legislation by the State of New York, provided that if the State of New York has already enacted 9 such legislation, sections 1 through 7 of this act shall take effect 10 immediately. Section 8 of this act shall take effect upon the 11 effective date of sections 1 through 7 of this act. 12 13 14 15 **STATEMENT** 16 This bill establishes a "Bi-State Commission to Recommend 17 Reforms to the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey." 18 19 The commission is to consist of 12 members, of whom six are to be appointed by the State of New York and six are to be appointed 20 by the State of New Jersey. The New Jersey members of the 21 22 commission are to be appointed as follows: two by the Senate 23 President; two by the Speaker of the General Assembly; one by the 24 Minority Leader of the Senate; and one by the Minority Leader of 25 the General Assembly. The New York legislature will determine 26 how the New York members are to be appointed. All members are to be independent public administration and transportation experts, 27 28 policymakers, and practitioners, but may not be current 29 commissioners, officers, directors, or employees of the Port 30 Authority. 31 The purpose of the commission is to study the current structure, 32 management, and oversight of the Port Authority and to recommend 33 legislation to the legislatures of the State of New Jersey and the 34 State of New York to reform the Port Authority. The report shall 35 include, but not be limited to: 36 1) policies to address divisions between the Port Authority's 37 New York and New Jersey counterparts and an analysis of whether the Port Authority could be restructured to resolve the two state's 38 39 divergent goals and objectives; 40 2) policies to address operational, structural, and management 41 issues at the Port Authority; 42 3) policies to address terms and method of appointment for Port 43 Authority commissioners and senior leadership; 44 4) policies establishing a formal and transparent process for non-45 emergency operational changes at the Port Authority including an

advance study and approval process and local government

notification requirements; and

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- 5) an analysis of the reforms implemented through New York's Public Authorities Report Act of 2009 and a determination of whether similar reforms should be implemented at the Port Authority.
- The commission is to submit a report of its findings and legislative proposals to the governors and legislatures of both states within 12 months of its first meeting.
