2	72-1-201. Creation of Department of Transportation Functions, powers, duties,

1	(1) There is created the Department of Transportation which shall:
5	<ul><li>(a) have the general responsibility for planning, research, design, construction,</li></ul>
5	maintenance, security, and safety of state transportation systems;

71	(1) The department shall develop a statewide comprehensive rail plan to create a
72	strategic vision for utilization, expansion, and interoperability of fixed rail lines in the state that
73	efficiently increase the share of travel on passenger rail and movement of freight by rail by
74	improving access, reliability, dependability, frequency, and efficiency.
75	(2) (a) The department shall develop a rail plan to integrate all uses of fixed rail within
76	the state to implement best practices, including evaluation of:
77	(i) integration with the:
78	(A) Utah State Rail Plan developed by the department;
79	(B) long-range transportation plan developed by the department; and
80	(C) long-range regional transportation plans developed by the state's metropolitan
81	planning organizations;
82	(ii) integration and interoperability of public transit and freight rail lines;
83	(iii) parallel tracking of multiple lines along various corridors;
84	(iv) innovative technologies to improve efficiency;
85	(v) electricity and other alternative fuel options;
86	(vi) integration with development of inland port facilities;
87	(vii) maximization of transit-oriented development opportunities;
88	(viii) optimization of methodology to capture value added through infrastructure
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89 <u>development;</u>

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90	(ix) innovative funding sources and mechanisms; and
91	(x) economic development opportunity through integration and coordination.
92	(b) (i) The department shall create the rail plan in two phases as described in
93	Subsections (2)(b)(ii) and (iii).
94	(ii) (A) For phase one of the rail plan development, the department shall, without
95	consideration of cost, determine the optimal rail plan to achieve the operational and service
96	goals as described in this section.
97	(B) While developing an optimal rail plan as described in Subsection (2)(b)(ii)(A), the
98	department shall consult with any large public transit district, as described in Section
99	17B-2a-802, to consider the large public transit district's strategic business plan for commuter
100	<u>rail.</u>
101	(iii) For phase two of the rail plan development, the department shall determine the
102	most efficient, cost-effective, and strategic approach to implementation of the rail plan,
103	accounting for all aspects of implementation, including:
104	(A) cost and funding challenges;
105	(B) legal issues related to interoperability and compliance with federal law; and
106	(C) any other challenges to implementation of the rail plan.
107	(3) To develop the rail plan, the department shall consult with relevant entities,
108	including:
109	(a) public transit providers;
110	(b) state and local governments;
111	(c) relevant federal agencies;
112	(d) metropolitan planning organizations; and
113	(e) private rail companies.
114	(4) The department may contract with a consultant to assist in developing the rail plan.
115	(5) Beginning in 2021, the department shall annually provide a report of the rail plan to
116	the Transportation Interim Committee and the Economic Development and Workforce Services
